

Parish Statement on Domestic Abuse

At Holy Trinity & St Mary's Guildford we recognise that all forms of domestic abuse are wrong and must stop. In our churches we strive to promote an environment in which:

We welcome all people in a safe, respectful atmosphere.

We recognise equality within relationships and amongst people.

We enable and encourage concerns to be raised and responded to appropriately.

We recognise that:

Domestic abuse can occur in all communities.

All survivors of domestic abuse (regardless of age, disability, gender, racial heritage, religious belief, sexual orientation or identity) have the right to equal protection from all types of harm or abuse.

Domestic abuse is often a systematic, repeated pattern which escalates in severity and frequency.

Domestic abuse can have a devastating effect on family life and cause long-term damage to children within the family.

Working in partnership with children, adults and other agencies is essential to promoting the welfare of any child or adult suffering abuse.

We will endeavour to respond to domestic abuse by:

Listening to and respecting all those involved in domestic abuse conflicts.

Raising awareness about other agencies, support agencies & resources through providing relevant, helpful information in public and women-only areas.
