Do try to be good, dear

'Do try to be good, dear.' You can hear in that forlorn cry the weary tones of Joyce Grenfell reciting one of her monologues on the radio. As the long-suffering nursery school assistant, surrounded by an invisible, but horribly real, class of unruly four-year olds, she would plead with her little charges: 'Johnny, put Lucy down ... No Julia dear, not the scissors ... George, don't do that ... *George*, what don't we do? ... Well, don't'.

She conveyed a picture of the beleaguered teacher, engulfed by a rising tide of mayhem. Eventually, and in the nick of time, she is rescued by the arrival of a more competent colleague. 'You know,' she admits sorrowfully as she looks at the struggling, tumbling little heap of humanity, 'There are times when I don't think love is really enough.'

Isn't it? Well, no, not really. Love is not enough. We need our rules. Without a structure of control we fall into all sorts of trouble. Those dark powers, latent in our childhood, threaten our adult lives: faction, malice, selfishness, envy, pride - the dismal result of our 'unruly wills and affections'.

Lent is a time to take stock of our self-imposed rules – that private code by which we try to stop our lives slipping into mayhem. The rules in themselves may not matter. What does is the freedom they bring - freedom from those obstacles which stop us from becoming the sort of people we would wish to be.

What sort of people would that be? Kind? Brave? Honest? Good humoured? Wise? More spiritually aware? More Christlike? The list of qualities could be endless, but it is never complete; there is always

something more. Our yearning for a better self remains unsatisfied and the sense of lost innocence persists. The Bible describes this yearning as our search for godliness – the image of God in which each of us is made, and which through our own fault we have smudged beyond recognition.

On Ash Wednesday the priest marks our foreheads with ash, and says,

Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return Turn away from sin and be faithful to Christ.

Gloomy? Not really. The dust from which God created Adam, and that means you and me, he moulded into his own image. And that's the image which he reveals in Christ, to whom he bids us turn, so that, in the words of St Paul, We beholding the glory of the Lord, are changed into the same image from glory to glory.

He has promised glory for us – for you and me, and for Johnny and Lucy and Julia - and for George, too. For each of us his love is enough. Ours may not suffice, but his makes up the deficit.
